

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According to Young, the police threw him on the ground and called him lazy.


The city of Rankin recently introduced a "loitering plus" ordinance which is "aimed to deal with very specific kinds of behavior that are potentially dangerous or considered to lead to criminal activity," says Michael Rogers, the director of the Center for Problem-Orienting Policing and a former chief of police.

Proponents of the ordinance say that by addressing loitering, police are able to stop more serious crimes like drug dealing and petty theft, before they begin. Furthermore, the ordinances encourage police to take a proactive interest in citizens and provide them with help as necessary. Opponents of the ordinance say that anti-loitering laws give the police license to hassle innocent people, especially people of color, even when they have not doing anything wrong. Rob Rubino, a researcher at the Justice Policy Center, said that "loitering plus" ordinances give the police substantial power: "Is the police department mature enough to handle this ordinance? That is the important question." – Jonathan Wagner, WTAE.com


